Catching Colds (A)

In fall and winter, many people catch colds. In fact, colds are the most common reasons people miss work or school. People spend billions of dollars on cold medicines, but many people do not understand how we catch colds. **Did you understand this first paragraph?**

These are ways people do NOT catch colds: We don't catch colds because the weather suddenly changes or because cold air blows on us. Also, we do NOT catch colds because we didn't wear a hat when it was cold outside or because we went outside with a wet head. Also, we do NOT catch colds from too much work or from staying up late at night. **Understand?**

You may be surprised to learn that you can kiss someone with a cold and NOT have to worry that you'll catch it. Also, you do NOT have to worry if someone with a cold sneezes or coughs on you; in fact, we do NOT catch colds from people sneezing on us. **Got it?**

Catching Colds (B)

How do people catch colds? We almost always catch a cold because we touched something dirty with our hands and then touched our nose, mouth, or eyes. Here's what usually happens. A person has a cold. This person blows his nose and gets cold germs on his hands. Then he touches something like a telephone, door knob, book, or computer. After he touches it with his dirty hands, a healthy person touches the same thing and then touches his nose, mouth, or eyes. The germs enter our bodies in that way. **Did you get this first paragraph?**

You might be surprised to know that most people touch their nose, eyes, and mouth about three times an hour. So it's easy for germs to get inside our bodies. In order to keep from getting a cold, or in order to not give your cold to a friend, you should wash your hands often. **Understand?**

If you have a cold, you should use a paper tissue when you blow your nose, and then throw it away. Then, if possible, you should wash your hands before you touch anything like a book, pen, or telephone that other people will touch. If someone near you has a cold, you should try to wash your hands often and try not to touch your eyes, nose, or mouth. **Got it?**

Catching Colds (C)

How do we know when we're catching a cold? Usually, a cold starts in our throat; we start to feel a sore throat. Then the cold moves to our nose, and we start to have a runny nose. Our bodies will start to fight the cold and, after about a week, our bodies will win the fight and we will feel healthy again. **Have you got this first paragraph?**

If our cold continues for more than two weeks, it probably means we don't really have a cold at all. Instead, we may have something more serious. In that case, we should go to a doctor. **Understand?**

The average adult gets two or three colds every year. On the other hand, children and teenagers get five to ten colds a year. This is because adults have developed a defense system against the types of colds they had when they were younger. But children need to catch a cold first in order to build a defense. Also, children catch more colds because they don't wash their hands often and because often they put their hands in their mouths after touching something dirty. **Got it?**
