Workshop Skits: Directions

From Common Sense Teaching ESL

Props:

- Desks for each student and a table/podium for the **Teacher**.
- A piece of paper for each student as homework for Skit 1.
- · Cell phones for Skit 6 and 9.
- A book with "Math" written on the cover.

Skit 1: A student arrives late.

The Teacher begins his lecture.

Student A comes in and sits in the second row. Then she unpacks her backpack. Some students look distracted and **Student B** looks annoyed.

Post-skit

The director holds up the sign, "What's the problem?" and audience answers the question on their handout. Then they call out the answer. The director asks **the Teacher** what students should do if they arrive late.

The director asks **Student B** how he felt when Student A sat in front of him unpacking her backpack.

Skit 2: One student doesn't turn in his homework and doesn't tell the Teacher.

The Teacher tells the students to bring their homework to his desk. All the students bring their papers up front except **Student C**.

Post-skit

The director holds up the sign, "What's the problem?" and audience answers the question on their handout. Then they call out the answer. The director asks **Student C** why she didn't turn in her homework. The director asks **the Teacher** what students should do if they don't have their homework.

Skit 3: Students chat.

The Teacher continues his lecture.

Students D and E are sitting next to each other and start to chat. **Student F** looks annoyed because she can't hear the lecture.

Post-skit

The director holds up the sign, "What's the problem?" and audience answers the question on their handout. Then they call out the answer. The director asks **Student F** how she felt when Students C and D were talking.

Skit 4: Student calls out answers to several questions before anyone else can participate.

The Teacher asks students questions.

Student G calls out the answer before other students can respond. Other students look annoyed at him.

Post-skit

The director holds up the sign, "What's the problem?" and audience answers the question on their handout. Then they call out the answer. The director asks **Student A** how she felt when Student G did this.

Skit 5: Student sits in a dream world.

The Teacher continues his lecture and calls on some students to answer some questions. When he calls on **Student B**, he can't answer because he hadn't been looking at the teacher.

Post-skit

The director holds up the sign, "What's the problem?" and audience answers the question on their handout. Then they call out the answer. The director asks **Student C** how she felt about Student B.

Problem 6: Student's cell phone rings.

The Teacher continues his lecture.

Student C's phone rings, and she answers it speaking in a foreign language. Other students look annoyed.

Post-skit

The director holds up the sign, "What's the problem?" and audience answers the question on their handout. Then they call out the answer. The director asks a student, **Student D** how he felt while Student C talked on the phone.

The director asks **the Teacher** what students should do if their phone rings during class.

Skit 7: Student is not participating in group

The Teacher tells students to get into groups of three or four and discuss (topic).

Students E, F and G get in a group. (Students A, B, C and D) get into different group.) Students E and F ask each other and Student G questions, but Student G barely responds and makes little eye contact.

Post-skit

The director holds up the sign, "What's the problem?" and audience answers the question on their handout. Then they call out the answer. The director asks **Students E and F** how they felt when Student G didn't participate.

Skit 8: Students speak another language in class

The students continue to discuss in groups from Skit 7. **Students A, B, C and D** are discussing, but then **Student C and D** start speaking in their native language. **Students A and B,** who don't understand their language, just sits there.

Post-skit

The director holds up the sign, "What's the problem?" and audience answers the question on their handout. Then they call out the answer. The director asks **Student A and B** how they felt when Students C and D started speaking in their native language.

Skit 9: Student starts to text message.

The Teacher begins to lecture again. Student E starts to text message.

Post-skit

The director holds up the sign, "What's the problem?" and audience answers the question on their handout. Then they call out the answer. The director asks a student, **Student F** how she felt when Student E did this.

The director asks the **Teacher** how he felt about this.

Skit 10: Student does homework for another class:

The director continues his lecture.

Student F opens her math book and starts to work on it.

Post-skit

The director holds up the sign, "What's the problem?" and audience answers the question on their handout. Then they call out the answer.

The director asks the Teacher how he felt about this.

Skit 11: Student doesn't listen to homework assignment explanation.

The Teacher explains what the homework is for the next class, including a reading and writing assignment. He then dismisses the class. All the students get up and start to leave, some chatting with each other softly.

Students G and **A** look a bit confused. **Student G** asks **A** if she understood what the assignment is. **Student A** says he isn't sure. They both guess (incorrectly) what it is.

As they are standing there, **the Teacher** asks them if they have any questions. They say that they are OK.

Post-skit

The director holds up the sign, "What's the problem?" and audience answers the question on their handout. Then they call out the answer. The director asks the **Teacher** what Student G and A should do
